




Thanks too to the editors, advisers and all others who are making the magazine possible.






BLOOD DONATION

There is an increase in the number of generous blood donors in our school. Every year the nurses from the Headquarters of the Hong Kong Red Cross Society come to our school to collect blood. In the year 1972-3, 31 students and staff responded. 95 donated the year after. This year a new record was set up on the fourth of October. 120 students and staff members donated their blood. When Rev. Brother Eugene appealed to the students to donate blood, his appeal did not fall on deaf ears. We responded heartily and rose to the occasion.

The school hall was buzzing with activity on Friday, 4th Oct., 74. The blood collecting Unit had come. The members of he Red Cross Society started their job. The lower form students were led in, class by class, by their teachers to observe the whole process.


A donor was well looked after. He was given a form to fill in. He had to furnish details as follows: his name, address, blood group and the date of his last blood donation. After handing in the form, his blood pressure was taken. A blood test was hen carried out, in which a few drps of blood were taken and added to the copper sulphate solution. After careful observation the nurses could determine if the donor was fit to donate his blood. He was then told to lie on a bed and the process started. Through a plastic tube, his blood flowed from a vein in his arm into a plastic bag hung beside the bed. After the donation, he rested on the bed for about five minutes and then a soft drink was offered to him. This is how the whole process was conducted. A donor left the hall with the satisfaction of having done his duty to mankind.
















SPORTS REPORT

Looking back over the reports for our first five years, every year has seen improvement both in participaion and resuls at all levels — inter-class, nter-collegiate and inter-school. Indeed, at inter-school level our results were such that last season (73-74) the Hong Kong Schools Sports Association awarded us the Omega Rosebowl for the Most Progressive School, of the Year, — a rather fitting climax to round off our fifth anniversary.

However, having been hus rewarded for our past efforts we were more or less under an obligation to do even better this year to prove that the award was deserved and that our results were not just a flash in the pan. The season is now almost over and again our overall result has shown further improvement. Having said this, it would be wrong to assume that all our teams have come out on top and that we are satisfied with our results, as a matter of fact some of our resuls were very disappointing and below expectations, but, happily, on the other hand other results were much better than expected and very satisfying.

As well as the usual teams in basketball, foatball, pingpong, badminton, athletics, cross-country and swimming, this year saw the introduction of softball and with considerable success. Also this year the Christian Brothers Schools Sports Association introduced an inter-collegiate basketball competition in which we were very successful emerging as Champions. Further expansion was seen in badminton with the introduction of a B team to join our highly successful C team.

The season started in September with the usual swimming gala and the results of the summer swimming raining courses were soon evident as sixteen records were broken in the inter-class gala and a further five were broken in the inter-school gala in October. Basketball and football were well off the ground before the swimming was over with both inter-class and inter-school gala in October. Basketball and football were well off the ground before the swimming was over with both inter-class and inter-school games. The inter-class games carried on throughout the year, well into the third term, while the inter-scohol leagues were all completed before Easter because all the knockout competitions were cancelled this year. Both A and B basketball teams

reached the final round finishing 2nd. and 4th. respectively (that's two years in a row as 'brides-maid' for A grade, perhaps next year we will succeed!). In football our C grade team earned promotion to division one when we finished as runners-up in division two while the A and B teams were relegated to division two after only one season in division one — rather disappointing results. One of the reasons for the bad results of A and B was the lack of a full-sized field for regular training, perhaps next season we can get the use of a field and put A and B back in division one where we belong.

Badminton, pingpong and softball all got underway in November and once again the intensive badminton training course bore results, as both teams (B and C) reached the final rounds. Our C team went on to win the Kowloon Championship without dropping a game, while the B team finished 4th. Not content with winning the Kowloon league the C team then travelled to Hong Kong to play the Hong Kong champions and took the overall trophy as well. Inter-school pingpong was back in the diary this year after a break of one year but our teams failed to qualify for the finals, however, in the inter-collegiate competition we were third. Softball, a virtually unknown game in CSK, started when a small group of boys asked permission to enter the open league. At first most of us thought it was a bit of a joke but after the results appeared on the notice board it was obvious that the boys knew what they were doing and soon softballs were to be seen round the playground at recess and lunch time. The team went from strength to strength and finished the season in 2nd place with six wins and one defeat.

Finally we come to Cross country and Athletics. As well as the usual inter-class competitions, which were both very successful, we also had teams in the Ying Wa invitation cross country race, the Kowloon City District Athletics Meet, the CBSSA inter-collegiate athletics meet and the inter-school cross country and athletics meet. We had two junior teams and two senior teams running in the invitation cross country and one junior team won the race while the two

senior teams finished 2nd, and 3rd. The Kowloon City District Athletics meet took place during the Chinese New Year holidays and it was rather difficult to get a full team out for it. It was a good opportunity to have competition experience and trials for the inter-collegiate and inter-school meets. The inter-collegiate meet this year was held in the Government Stadium as part of the Centenary Year celebration of the arrival of the La Salle Brothers in Hong Kong, with His Excellency The Governor as Guest of Honour. While we failed to win any of the three grades we were runners-up in A and B which was an improvement on last year. Following on from the inter-collegiate meet we had the inter-school meet in mid-March and here our athletes were really up against the best in Hong Kong as w were taking part in division one for the first time. We didn't take long to find out the difference in standard between division one and division two and soon realised that winning in division one is not easy. Not surprisingly we did not feature among the trophy winners but we did collect enough points to ensure our place in division one again next season and now that we know what is required hopefully we will do much better next year. To round off the athletics season three of our athletes took part in the Hong Kong Junior National Championships held in mid-April and were well rewarded for their efforts. Dennis Pang (5A) took second place in the 100m. and became Junior Champion in the 110m. Hurdles with his best ever time, Jihn Leung (6A) was second in the 400m. hurdles also with his best ever time while Cheung Kwai Lun (5D) was fourth in the high jump - congratulations to all three boys for their achievements.

In closing this report congratulations go out to all boys and teachers of the various teams who kept the name of CSK well to the fore on the sports fields of Hong Kong and to those who tried and didn't quite make it remember there is no easy way to the top — it requires hard training all the time. If all our teams approached training with the same determination and perseverance as our A basketball team and C badminton team then we would be at the top in any sport that we cared to enter.




In order to save time, we finished our light lunches in the junk. Immediately we began our field trip after we arrived the Island at noon.


Kat O is one of the most remote islands in the N. T. located at the NE part of the Tolo Harbor. The narrowest piece of land in the central part of the Island separates the Crooked Harbor in the west from O Pui Tong (Bay) in the east. It is mainly dominated by pyroclastic rocks with some acid lavas in the NE and coarse tuff in the SE, but one of our trip purposes was to find out those limited and famous Kat O Breccia and Conglomerate in the Island. And we did.

We set off from the Pier and had a very careful searching and observation with the help of Mr Lau around the coasts of Chek Kok Tau (North Point). After three hours of field work, we came back to the Pier and began our journey homeward bound.







Training:


- 1. A pre-enrollment course & a basic drill course were organized for our new members.

P.E.L.F.U.S.:


- 1. A camp was held at Sai Kung.

Young Christian Students Movement




The initials Y.C.S. stand for "The Young Christian Students Movement." The movement aims at training young students to become mature independent Christians, citizens and leaders.



So the Y.C.S. of our school try to foster the Christian Spirit in our environment and to cultivate friendship and unity among all pupils. We aim to Christianize the world by seeing what society needs, judging what should be done about it and carrying on the decisions, so as to fill the world which is full of hatred and injustice with Christian Love.

We know that one who leads a Christian Life is not necessarily a Catholic. It is sufficient to follow the teachings of Christ. So, to be a Y.C.S. member one does not have to be a Catholic.

The Y.C.S. of our school was first established in Oct. 1968 and was the first official club in Chan Sui Ki. This group is still very young and lacking in experience. There are many things that need to be improved. At present, we have 3 moderators and about 20 members. JOINT SCHOOL SCIENCE QUIZ

The Joint School Science Quiz was organised by St. Clare's Girls' School and Raimondi College. The Quiz was sponsored by the S.C.M. Post. The questions of the Quiz were based on the science syllabus for the H.K. Certificate of Education Examination. There are altogether 18 schools took part and each school had to send four representatives with one of them as the reserve. They must be the students of F.4 or below. The first match was held on 25th Feb., 1975, at Raimondi College. Our school competed with St. Paul's Secondary School & Wah Yan College (Kln), unfortunately, we lost the match in the first round. The final match was held on 10th April, at St. Clare's Girls' School. The competing schools were King's College, St. Mark's School and Ying Wa College. The champion of the Quiz is King's College. After the final match, trophies were presented to the first three schools and souvenir was presented to each participating school.

Joint School Science Exhibition

The Science Society of our school has joined the 'Joint School Science Exhibition' which will be held in August 1975. Projects will be displayed in the City Hall Exhibition Hall for about 7 days. A Fund Raising Campaign was organized by the J.S.S.E. Planning Committee on 27th Dec., 1974 at Maryknoll Sisters' School. The campaign was similar to the "Walk for a Million" entitled "Walkathon". The distance was 15 km. Our school had about 15 students (most of them are the committee members of the Science Society). We raised about \$350.00.

A Fund Raising Variety Show organised by the J.S.S.E. committee was held at St. Mary's Canossian College on 8th February, 1975.

The 8th J.S.S.E. fund raising film show featuring the film "Misunderstood" was shown on 28th March, 1975 (Sat.) at 10.00 at the Imperial Cinema.

CHEMISTRY CLUB

Under the guidance of our advisors, the club seeks ways to arouse interest of the students in the subject. The main aim is to cultivate interest in Chemistry through experiments and lectures etc., and thus provide more explicit and simpler ways of making the subject more interesting and easier to understand.

We have embarked on a wide range of experiments and lectures. However, there is still room for improvement. Our committee members have always felt the need to increase contact between senior & junior members, and the need for more regular activities for them.

PHYSICS CLUB

In this year, we have about 50 members, mostly from F.3 to F.6.

As soon as the committee was established, our first activity was a Physics Experiment Exhibition in school during the Open Day. The exhibition was aimed to provide a better chance for the students, especially those of the visitors, to enter the laboratory and to understand more about the school. The content of the exhibition was divided into two parts, experiments demonstration and explanation of some electric devices.

Lectures and demonstrations were given to the members in order to enrich our member's knowledge about Physics. However, we are sorry to report that there are fewer activities in the second half of the term because the school had a lot of activities and this does not leave time for us.

Finally, we would like to vote thanks to all the members and advisors for the support.

Clectronics Club

The C.S.K. Electronics Club has been dynamic in the past two years. Its fundamental aim is to arouse interest of students in the field of electronics and to promote general understanding of simple electric and electronic devices and their working which one comes across in everyday life.

In order to achieve this aim, fundamental principles and their applications, techniques in operating electronic testing instruments and in repairing various electrical contrivances were introduced to members. Besides lectures, demonstrations were also performed and films were shown so as to ensure a better acquisition of the theories.

Our main indoor activities were building up of various electronic devices, such as high power amplifier, radio, camera flash unit, wireless control unit and walkie-talkie. One of the most outstanding projects which we successfully completed is the automatic touch-on control panel which is being used for inter-class quiz competition. This control panel is the one which is used, for the last three years, in the Joint School Science Quiz. We have been helping other clubs and societies in the school whenever electrical wiring or lighting is found necessary.

On the School Open Day, we displayed a many projects which include adjustable stroboscope, electronic calculating machine, smoke pollution reduction unit, camera flash unit, D.C. fluorescent lamp and many other interesting electronic devices. We are particularly proud of this since all the projects displayed were set by our members. We take this opportunity to thank Mr. M. O'Brien, Mr. Nelson Ma (Ex-Chairman) and Mr. Yuen Kwok Wan (Ex-Chairman) for helping us and making the Open Day Exhibition (Electronics) a success.

This year, we have joined he Joint School Science Exhibition which will be held during the summer holidays in the City Hall. This is our first trial and we hope it will be a success.

- (3) Fund Raising film show:


This is jointly organised by the Prefects' Board & the Science Society. We received our share of \$370.00.

INTERESTS



SHOULD CAPITAL PUNISHMENT BE ABOLISHED

'Engineer's wife robbed', 'Youth killed', 'Seven months for robbery', 'Death sentence commuted', Such local news items appear as headlines on our newspapers.

In Hong Kong, crime has been increasing at an alarming rate. Every citizen feels unsafe and fears to be robbed or attacked. One of the causes of this problem is that the legal system is too lenient. Robbers and burglars are just imprisoned for several months and then they are released. A murderer sentenced to death will approach the Governor, who on the advice of the Executive Council, will commute the death sentence to life imprisonment or even change it to the offence of manslaughter. Consequently, what will the other thugs think, and what will be our situation then?

Capital Punishment is the penalty of death imposed for a serious crime. Today it is rarely implemented in Hong Kong. Since every criminal should be punished according to the seriousness of the crime he commits, a pick-pocket is imprisoned for a few months, a burglar for a few years, therefore, a murderer should be shot or hanged. It is simply 'an eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth'. Some people may think that it is cruel for us, homo-sapiens, to kill our brothers in such a way. But, have you thought about the victim, the victim's family, his parents, his brothers and sisters, his beloved wife or sons? Is it not cruel for the murderer to have destroyed such a happy family? Does anyone like to have such a disaster happen to his family? Moreover, many criminals are unpardonable and incorrigible. Hence, why does the government have to use the taxpayers' money to lavish living and accommodation on these persons? Surely, they will return to crime after they are released from prison.

If the crime rate, especially murders, continues to increase, not only will tourists refuse to come here but it might also affect the inflow of foreign investors, and as a result, the development of Hong Kong will be hindered.

In order to frighten those wicked fellows and in order to make Hong Kong a more stable and peaceful place, Capital Punishment should not be abolished. Its resumption is a necessity in Hong Kong.
